Thoughts on Romans

2:1 Therefore thou art inexcusable, O man, whosoever thou art that judgest: for wherein thou judgest another, thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same things.

It is always good to examine previous verses when the word "therefore" is found in Scripture. When we do that we can understand the context of what is to come next.

The previous verses in chapter 1 explain why unsaved people are inexcusable. God has revealed Himself through His amazing creation (1:20), but man, even realizing God exists and is the Creator did not glorify Him and were not thankful for what He provides (1:21). In man's refusal to praise God an arrogance that degenerated into foolishness developed (1:22). Idolatry, homosexuality, self-worship, punishment from God, and an awful array has become the norm (1:23-32).

By saying whosoever thou art that judgest Paul has in mind the legalism and the hypocrisy of the religious leaders, especially the Pharisees and Sadducees that had such a detrimental influence among the Jewish people of his day. Paul knew all about this kind of sin, having been a Pharisee before his salvation experience while on his way to abuse Christians in Damascus. He had judged that Christians were not chosen of God and chose to judge them in his own way of thinking.

Then the Apostle declares "thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest does the same things." Our Lord spoke strong words on this very subject: "And why beholdest thou the mote that is in thy brother's eye, but considerest not the beam that is in thine own eye? Or how wilt thou say to thy brother, Let me pull out the mote out of thine eye; and behold, a beam is in thine own eye" (Matthew 7:3-4).

It is difficult enough for a believer to honor God in every way. All should understand that simple truth! Unfortunately, there are some who name the NAME of our Lord who tend to find a "mote" (=a small speck of dirt) in the life of some other brother instead of repenting of the sin of judgmentalism in their own lives.

In other words, such people, who seem to enjoy "correcting" others, are actually committing sin instead of recognizing that they have disobeyed the clear teaching from Jesus in Matthew 7.

Sometimes these "motes" are simply disagreements on a difficult passage in Scripture. Sometimes these "motes" are differences in practice or lifestyle. Other times there may be some sin that should be confronted.

Some might ask, "If a brother has stumbled into sin, what should we do?"

Paul addresses this issue in his epistle to the Galatians: "Brethren, if a man be overtaken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such a one in the spirit of meekness; considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted" (Galatians 6:1).

If correction is needed, it should be provided by believers who are *spiritual*, not by some condemning legalist!

Further, the goal should be to *restore* the believer, not to condemn him!

Even further, the restorer needs to be sure his/her heart is right when the interactions take place, because arrogance can easily develop!

Mature Christians know these things!

May God help us to avoid arrogance, care for others who may be struggling, and recognize the importance of restoring others to a close relationship with Him!
