Thoughts on Romans

1:29-31 Being filled with all unrighteousness, fornication, wickedness, covetousness, maliciousness; full of envy, murder, debate, deceit, malignity; whisperers, Backbiters, haters of God, despiteful, proud, boasters, inventors of evil things; disobedient to parents, without understanding, covenant-breakers, without natural affection, implacable, unmerciful.

Make no mistake about it, this list of such disgusting sins explains very clearly where all mankind stands before a holy God.

The truth is that man cannot do anything to make himself acceptable to God: man *became vain in their imaginations, and their foolish hearts were darkened. Professing to be wise, they became fools* (Romans 1:21b-22). Man is born into sin (Romans 3:23; 5:12), and that sin adversely affects his thinking and his relationship to God.

Most people in the world today ignore God and therefore believe they are not accountable to Him.

This is why passages such as <u>Romans 1:29-31</u> are so important! As long as people are not confronted with the truth of their sin, they will not see any need to repent, believe, or listen to such important elements of the Gospel as the blood, faith, grace, and the resurrection of our Lord!

When a man finally recognizes how thoroughly corrupt, he is, and the Holy Spirit takes the Word of God and works on his heart, then repentance can take place, causing one to be born again.

This passage begins with "being filled." The participle here explains why God reacted in <u>verse</u> 28: God gave them over to a reprobate mind. This word is in the perfect tense in the original Greek text. There was a point in time when man was filled with unrighteousness and man is **still** filled with unrighteousness. It is a perpetual condition, solved only by God's grace when one is saved.

So just what does Paul describe in these verses? This list of *unrighteousness* includes sexual sin ("fornication," and "without natural affection"), selfishness ("covetousness," and "envy"), arrogance ("proud" and "boasters"), general depravity ("inventors of evil things" and "maliciousness"), disobedience to authority that God has ordained ("disobedience to parents" and "covenant breakers"), ignorance ("without understanding"), hatred ("haters of God"), and desirous of rebellion ("implacable" and "unmerciful").

Each one of these sins is condemned many times in Scripture, but the Holy Spirit inspired the Apostle to include them in this list.

We live in a world that is full of individual sin, religious sin, and political sin. Consider what our Lord proclaimed to His disciples: *And He charged them, saying, take heed, beware of the leaven of the Pharisees, and of the leaven of Herod* (Mark 8:15). Leaven symbolizes evil, and it spreads!

How are today's believers able to get the victory in such an evil age?

We do well to take Paul's admonition seriously: I beseech you therefore, brethren, by the mercies of God, that ye present your bodies a living sacrifice, holy, acceptable unto God, which is your reasonable service. And be not conformed to this world: but be ye transformed by the renewing of your mind, that ye may prove what is that good, and acceptable, and perfect, will of God (Romans 12:1-2).

Verse 1 speaks of offering our bodies as a sacrifice.

Verse 2 speaks of a renewing of the mind. Jesus tells us that such a renewal is accomplished by the Word of God: Sanctify them through Thy truth: Thy Word is truth.
